Do you want the highlights of all the frightening issues we've found in our elections? Here are just a few.

- The electronic **voting machines** are vulnerable, to say the least: <u>Here, here, he</u>
- And don't forget Williamson County has already had severe machine problems: Here, here, here and here.
- Electronic voting machines can be hacked: <u>Here</u>.
- The **SVP of Security for ES&S** has admitted this is so: <u>Here</u>.
- Hacking machines is easy to do, as this cyber security professional proves: Here.
- Another cyber security/military expert affirms this in court testimony: <u>Here</u>.
- Vulnerable machines can turn an election on its head: <u>Here</u> and <u>here</u>.
- Ballot marking devices (BMDs) are highly vulnerable; hand-marked paper ballots are best for voting: <u>Here</u>.
- In fact, 68% of the nation votes on hand-marked paper ballots; a minority uses ballot marking devices. Here.
- Voting in **vote centers** is full of problems that could affect elections, not to mention that it goes counter to what the Tennessee Constitution says we should be doing... voting in precincts: Here and here.
- Election officials affirm precinct voting is preferred and hand-marked paper ballots are allowed: <u>Here.</u>
- The Williamson County Election Commission (WCEC)'s **VPNs can't effectively protect** the internet connections connecting vote centers: <u>Here</u>.
- Even worse, look at how many millions of dollars are being spent by **companies that are still being hacked**: Here. And we're not even spending pennies in comparison to protect our vote.
- Despite recent successful elections eliminating BMDs and using hand-marked paper ballots, the WCEC will not honestly and thoroughly consider bringing this election model into the mix: <u>Here</u>.
- Why we believe this is true? Because the first step out of the gate for the WCEC's HMPB study was **adding an entirely new machine** costing \$475,000: Here. Nothing was said about **moving back to precinct voting**, which we did until 2020 and eliminates the need for that new machine and its half million dollar price tag.
- There are some **highly secure options for hand-marked paper ballots** -- where the technology is moved from the machines into the ballots that is being ignored by election commissions. Here.
- Our voter rolls are dirty and must be cleaned.
- And the state's claim that Tennessee is **number 1** in the nation in election integrity? Not true. State election leaders merely highjacked a Heritage scorecard study that talked ONLY about states with decent election LAWS on the books. Here. The report said nothing about:
 - o The use of vulnerable machines; or
 - Whether or not counties use BMDs or paper ballots (most of the nation uses hand-marked paper ballots as this chart <u>here</u> shows); or
 - o If vote centers or precincts are better for voting; or
 - o If their voter rolls are truly clean; or
 - o If all voters are audited to be sure they were legally able to vote; or
 - If all paper ballots are legit (auditors found ten different paper types in Maricopa County in the 2020 election should have been only 1); or
 - o If the internet really is fed into vote centers; or
 - o If poll watchers are given adequate freedom to ensure the election was run fairly; or
 - How thoroughly poll workers are trained; or
 - o If every county has a post-election audit, or... or... I think they were hoping no one would challenge them on this.
