Williamson County Election Commission

The Williamson County Election Commission (WCEC) held an open house on Friday, October 11th for candidates in the upcoming November 5th election and citizens to view the ES&S voting machines used in our elections and ask questions.

Two candidates and one citizen were at the opening of the two-hour open house.

- They were welcomed by WCEC Chairman Jonathan Duda and he introduced the two IT technicians who set up the machines and oversee them during the election. John Brake and Tony Clifford.
- Duda showed the first candidate the process at the ballot marking device, and that device promptly jammed. Twice. A new ballot had to be issued.
 - (We wouldn't have machine jamming problems if we used hand-marked paper ballots!)
- The open house was to shut down at 4 p.m.

The founder of the <u>Tennessee Voters for Election Integrity</u>, Frank Limpus, attended the event and offered the following in comment:

- While we have voiced major concerns about the voting machines and election processes in Williamson County for several years now, the Williamson County Election Commission has done little to address concerns, especially the top five that we currently have documented.
- Were we able to rebut what the WCEC was telling candidates and citizens in this open house, here's what we would have affirmed:
- The machines can be hacked or mis-perform.
 - This has occurred in elections across the nation and, in the October 2021 election, here in Franklin.
 - Here are several cybersecurity experts affirming this: <u>Here</u>, <u>here</u>, <u>here</u>, <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>, to start.
 - The senior vice president of security for ES&S admits the machines can be hacked. Here.
 - These machines are tested by the <u>US Election Assistance Commission</u> (EAC) against <u>standards that are abysmally weak</u>.
 - o <u>Ballot marking devices</u> are one of the most vulnerable machines.
 - Vulnerable voting machines can definitely produce incorrect election results. Here and here.
 - So, why are citizens forced to use them despite this evidence? Why won't the
 WCEC listen to their customers, the citizens, and change the process?
- Neither the state nor Williamson County are allowed to inspect the inside of the machines or the software for nefarious components.
 - Disguised wireless components and components from China have been found in the voting machines, especially ES&S machines.
 - Software/hardware changes can manipulate how the voting machine performs.
 - There are no cyber security experts who inspect every machine as it enters
 Tennessee or a county from a vendor to ensure that we have received machines
 that do not have wireless capabilities. This critical issue is not verified.
- Our ballots are NOT voter-verifiable despite WCEC claims that they are.
 - The voter's vote selections on the ballot are <u>encased in a bar code</u>, made by the ballot marking device we're forced to use.
 - o The tabulator that counts the ballots reads the bar code, NOT the text on the ballot.

- There is no way a voter can confirm that his vote selections are reflected in the bar code... because no human reads bar code!
- Thus, you can't verify your vote no matter what the election commission tries to tell you.

Citizens have been crying out for hand-marked paper ballots as a hedge against the dangers of the ballot marking devices.

- 70% of US voters vote on hand-marked paper ballots, not on ballot marking devices. Yes, even California, New York and Chicago!
- So, what does a majority of the nation know about the use of hand-marked paper that the Williamson County Election Commission doesn't?
- In 2023, the WCEC promised the County Commission and citizens to study how we
 might bring hand-marked paper ballots into our voting process. But once they
 secured the money to purchase the voting machines, they quietly dropped the
 promise of this study earlier this year.
- o Another reason we've found it difficult to trust the election commission.

• We have been forced to vote in vulnerable vote centers, instead of precincts, in which we were successfully voting for decades.

- Vote centers are actually illegal according to the <u>Tennessee State Constitution</u> (<u>Article IV Section 1</u>).
- But the state is pushing <u>vote centers</u> to save money (it hasn't happened) and increase turnout (that hasn't happened either).
- We used to vote in 43 precinct locations before moving to 25 vote centers in 2020.
 A reduction in voting locations of 42%.
 - (No wonder there are long lines at times when you vote they're squeezing more people into fewer voting locations).
- Problem: The internet is now piped into every voting location (it wasn't there before) to prevent vote hoping.
 - Why: They have to eliminate a voter from the election voter list once he/she votes at the first voting center. That can happen because all vote centers and the election office are now connected via the internet.
- So, now you have the <u>internet near machines that can't prove they don't have</u>
 wireless capabilities. The <u>ExpressLink system/ExpressVote</u> printers aren't even
 certified, so election officials have no idea whatsoever is contained in the
 equipment.
- Election officials say the internet is protected by a VPN, but read <u>here about the</u> <u>documented weaknesses of VPNs</u>.
- And did you know that Cisco, the company that manufactures the VPN we use, was hacked in 2022? They couldn't even protect their own company, yet they're supposed to protect our election?
- And <u>read here about the number of companies worldwide</u> that are spending billions of dollars to protect their data, yet are still being hacked. In comparison, Williamson County is spending less than pennies on the security of our voting process.
- Now do you see why we have been so vocal about our research into these issues and the dangers they pose to our elections? And why it baffles us that the WCEC does next to

nothing to address the concerns? And why they simply love machines in the voting process? Unless, of course, there is an alternative reason why they don't want to address them....?

 trustworthy elections to us. Plus, citizens MUST vote into office grassroots candidates who
 are vocal and committed to better securing our elections and turning our county around
 before we lose our Republic.

Williamson County Commission

The budget committee met on Monday <u>Packet</u> (to see what was discussed during the budget committee meeting, scroll to appropriations page 3 to see the a thumb nail and page 99 for the full resolutions) <u>video</u>.

The Budget Committee can only make recommendations to the Commission. In their meeting on Monday, they voted to recommend passage of all resolutions considered. As you can see, some are large and some are small. Some are grants, which are no brainers, and some have costs. The biggest one was resolution 10-24-10 which is a loan from the county to the school district for \$13m. This is a temporary loan that has more to do with cash flow than anything else. The school district needs funds now to pay their bills but the tax money hasn't come it yet. What you will see, if you watch how things work, is that money is constantly being moved from one bucket to another depending on cash needs. The full commission will be voting on this on Monday.

Next week, the full **commission will meet on Monday** at 7:00 pm at 1320 W. Main in the main auditorium <u>agenda</u> for video, go to Williamson County Commission video 10/14/24 to watch live or a recording after the 24th.

Board of Mayor and Aldermen (BOMA)

On Tuesday, BOMA held their **work session** <u>agenda video</u> and board meeting. During the work session, they discussed the Armistead project that I mentioned last week. It is 192 acres across from West Haven that proposes to include 837 new homes. Many people have asked about impact fees that the developers pay per home and in this case, the developers will be charged \$3,602,448.00 which comes to \$4,304 per home. There is no mention of the 75-room motel. Another interesting discussion was the new rules for assessing impact fees and how much money they will generate over the next 10 years. It's worth watching if you want to understand the magnitude of development that has been approved and what is actually being built. The Glovercroft annexation is also worth watching as well.

Actually, the whole meeting is worth watching if you have two hours of time.

The work session was followed by the board meeting <u>agenda</u> The video portion is not available. Since there is no video, I don't have much to say about this meeting.

The Budget/finance committee met on Thursday agenda There is no video for this.
